

Leaflet European Patent in Switzerland

Territory

The Swiss part of this European patent covers the territory of the Swiss Confederation and the principality of Liechtenstein. The Swiss part of your European patent has the same effect as a national Swiss patent.

National patent number

No national patent number is assigned to the Swiss part of the European patent.

Duration

Provided that the annual national renewal fees are paid, the patent has a duration of 20 years from the European filing date.

Compulsory use

If a patented invention is not or not sufficiently worked without valid reason in Switzerland or Liechtenstein within 3 years from the date of grant of the patent or within 4 years from the date of application, whichever period expires last, any interested party may apply to a Court for the grant of a compulsory license. Where the grant of licenses is inadequate to satisfy the needs of the Swiss market, two years after the date of grant of the first compulsory license, cancellation of the patent may be applied for by any third party proving an interest. Importation of patented products is deemed working of the patent in Switzerland.

Patentees who are citizens of Germany or the USA or are domiciled in either of these countries, and who work corresponding patents in their home country or country of domicile respectively, need not work their Swiss patents.

Marking

Marking is not compulsory, but the following indication is recommended on the patented goods and/or their packaging: "EP/CH No...".
